ASHES TO ASHES AND DUST TO DUST

In February, we begin the season of Lent with our Ash Wednesday service.

Ashes are prominent on Ash Wednesday. There are many Christians who will be wearing ashes on their forehead that day. Are they showing off? Are they trying to stand out? What does it mean?

There are a few reasons why we receive ashes on Ash Wednesday.

FIRST, the ashes remind us of our sinfulness.

Since ancient times, God's people have used ashes

as a sign of humble repentance (e.g. Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Daniel 9:3: Matthew 11:21; Luke 10:13). This tradition was carried on by the early church and remains an important tradition today. When one willingly goes up to a pastor and receives ashes on his/her forehead (or on their back of their hand), they are admitting that they are sinners in desperate need of salvation. They are admitting that they have sinned not only against their neighbors, but against God Himself. The ashes demonstrate that without God, all people are spiritually dead. The ashes remind the wearer of their need to repent and confess in order to be turned back to God. The ashes demonstrate our pleading that the Lord would purify us. The ashes serve as a tangible and visible sign of our failure to love God as much as He loves us.

SECOND, the ashes remind us of our mortality.

The receiving of ashes on Ash Wednesday also remind us of our mortality, which is the direct result of God's condemnation of our sin. God said to Adam, "You are dust and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). Ashes serve as a solemn reminder that the price of sin is death. Man cannot escape death. Often, people today feel as if they are invincible. It's easy to feel like we're at the top of the world, capable of doing anything that we desire. We keep ourselves busy doing "good" things, but fail to recognize that in reality we are dead in sin. People don't like to think about death. Our culture has seemingly sterilized death. We make every attempt to avoid death. Death is uncomfortable. And, that's why ashes are so important. They are the physical reminder that God created man from the dust of the earth and one day all men will return to the dust of the earth. Ashes to ashes and dust to dust. The ashes force us to remember that we are merely mortal and that God alone is sovereign and reigns for all eternity.

THIRD, the ashes remind us that we have been redeemed.

Ashes also tell us the good news of the Gospel! You see, ashes aren't just smeared randomly or haphazardly across people's foreheads. The ashes are given in the shape of the cross. In receiving the ashes, we remember that our Lord Jesus took on the fullness of our humanity. He who was sinless became our sin. Jesus the Christ was crucified on a cross. He was crucified for you. He descended into hell where He endured the fullness of the wrath of God on your behalf. Then Jesus conquered death through His resurrection. He was resurrected for you. In doing so, He has taken the ashes of our past and created in us new life, allowing us to live forever in the holy presence of God! He has redeemed His children, making us clean and new. Through the cross of Christ, the power of death has been destroyed. Through the cross there is life. The cross-shaped ashes on our foreheads proclaim the good news that sin and death have been conquered through the cross of Christ.

In our Ash Wednesday service again, this year, the Lord's Supper immediately follows the receiving of ashes. We, who were once dead in our sins, we who deserve to die, can come to the Lord's Table literally wearing the cross of Christ. Here, at the Lord's table, those who have humbled themselves before the Lord, who have admitted their sin, who know they deserve death, are instead given the new life that is only found through the body

and blood of our loving Lord Jesus. Here, at the Lord's table, those marked with the cross of Christ are raised up, strengthened through God's mercy, love, and grace, and sent forth into the world to proclaim the good news!

I pray you can join us on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. There is no mandate to receive ashes. However, we offer that opportunity for those who wish to participate. You can join us at our school chapel that morning and/or in the evening at the downtown church



forworship. You are able to receive ashes in the form of a cross on your forehead or on the back of your hand. When receiving the ashes, the pastor says: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return."

You may not know, but the ashes that we use are traditionally made out of the palm branches used previously on Palm Sunday, a day when people rejoiced and praised Jesus only days before they turned on him and yelled "Crucify Him!" (Matthew 27:22; Mark 15:13; Luke 23:21; John 19:6) This serves as a powerful reminder that people are sinful, death is real, but Resurrection Day (Easter) is coming!

Come, all are welcome. All are in need of salvation. Let the Lord use the ashes of your past to create in you a clean heart and new life in Him.

THE PASCAL TRIDUUM

The Pascal Triduum is the three days of Jesus' Passion ending Lent and moving us into the Easter Season. The Triduum begins on Maundy (Holy) Thursday and ends with Easter Day. These three days incorporate three (or four if some observe the Easter Eve Vigil) separate services that are actually part of one, whole worship service. Maundy (Holy) Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Eve Vigil, and Easter. There is no benediction (final blessing) on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday since these services are not concluded, but anticipate the next worship service as part of the whole three days of worship - The Pascal Triduum.

Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday begins our worship with Corporate confession and Absolution. The

focus for this part of the Triduum is on Jesus and the disciples celebrating the Passover - His Last Supper with His disciples. It is from within the Passover that Jesus instituted and gave us His Holy Supper. It was here that Jesus washed the feet of His followers and taught them (and us) humility and service to one another. The celebration of the Sacrament of the Altar bestows the grace of God and the forgiveness of our sins upon us which was won by Christ on the cross. We conclude this worship part of the Triduum with the stripping of the Altar in preparation for Christ's death and burial on Friday.


Good Friday

Good Friday carries on the Triduum with a noon service and in the evening we have a Tenebrae service - a service of darkness. This is a day of joy as we remember the sacrifice Jesus made for us on the cross. This service is not a funeral service, but we do worship with restrained joy and minimized music. It is, after all, GOOD Friday - good for us, that is, as

our sins were paid for by Jesus. We leave this day of the Triduum in silent, somber, joyful reflection of the God/Man's death in our place, and anticipate the unrestrained joy of Easter Day when we gather to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord.

Easter Eve Vigil

In some churches, the Vigil of Easter is celebrated. The vigil is a "keeping watch" through the night in anticipation of Jesus' resurrection early on Sunday. A worship service on Saturday evening may end the Triduum with the benediction and the Easter Acclamation, "Christ is Risen!" When the Vigil is observed, this would then begin the Easter season for those worshiping and keeping the vigil. Worshipers gather on this evening in



expectation for the news of Christ's resurrection. Some churches in our area do have Easter Vigil services.

Easter Morning

Easter does certainly bring the Triduum to a joyful and glorious conclusion. The resurrection of our Lord means nothing without His death in the sinner's place. And His death would mean nothing without His resurrection to life and His victory over the grave, sin, and the devil. He is Risen, indeed.

IF YOU HAVE NEVER TAKEN PART IN ALL OF THE HOLY WEEK SERVICES WE OFFER, I ENCOURAGE YOU TO TRY THEM OUT THIS YEAR - You have to go through Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday in order to get to Easter Morning.

- 3/28 Maundy Thursday 7pm we walk with our Lord and Join Him at the Last Supper
- 3/29 Good Friday noon We consider the suffering of our Lord
- 3/29 Good Friday 7pm TENEBRAE a service of darkness as we contemplate the suffering and death of Jesus....
- 3/30 SAT NO WORSHIP SERVICE
- 3/31 EASTER SUNDAY 6, 9, 11am Celebrate our Lord's Resurrection.

During our midweek services we have been walking with Jesus - the "Places of the Passion" Continue walking with Jesus throughout Holy Week!

May God bless this time of worship as we receive His gracious blessings in Christ Jesus - our Savior and our Lord.

Connected to Christ

... [H] olding fast to the Head, from whom the whole body, nourished and knit together through its joints and ligaments, grows with a growth that is from God. (Colossians 2:19)

Our youth theme this year is "Building Faith Together." In January, we explored connections – our connection to God and with one another. (Coincidently this was also the theme for National Lutheran Schools Week.) Using our theme for this year, how are we connected with God? How are we connected to each other? The plumbing, wires, and Wi-Fi connect the individual rooms in a house together. We are connected to God through His grace in Word and Sacrament. This connection is our vertical relationship with God. We are also connected to each other by our vocations. We can call our connection with each other our horizontal relationship. Our horizontal relationships are also called our vocations meaning callings from God.

When Christ brought us to faith and cleansed us in the waters of holy baptism, Jesus established His vertical connection with you. We did nothing to earn or deserve this connection. Our vertical connection is established by grace alone. God's grace transforms our hearts and minds so that we become children of God. In baptism, God washed away all your sins and gave you His righteousness. Our vertical connection with God bestows on us passive righteousness. This is the righteousness of faith. Through our connection with God, we are given His grace, mercy, love, and forgiveness. God's radical love for us in this relationship transforms how we see others. We see others in the light of God's mercy and love. Our vertical relationship with God then empowers and transforms our horizontal relationship with others.

One of Martin Luther's most brilliant moves was to remove the term vocation from solely living the religious life as a monk or as a priest but as a term for every day Christian service. Through the blood of Jesus, our relationships are transformed into opportunities to be Jesus's hands and feet in this world. Vocations are not extraordinary acts of service that are for a select few – but are callings Christians do every single day. Christ has given us these relationships in our roles as fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, sons, daughters, aunts, uncles, godparents, etc. Vocation is not limited to what we do for a living – that may be a place where God calls us to serve but what we do does not have to define us or be the principle source of where we derive our vocational responsibilities. Simply being a good father or mother is a greater calling in God's eyes than being a CEO of a successful company. We know this because God has given us clear commands on what it means to be

a parent and what the blessings of parenthood offer. Never underestimate what God will do through you to bring His words of comfort and forgiveness in the various connections He has placed you in.

We are very blessed with the various connections we have in Youth Nights. During Youth Nights, we connect to God in Word and in prayer, and we connect to each other in fun, games, and conversations. As we are united together, we are given opportunities to grow as St. Paul illustrates in Colossians 2:19, "[H]olding fast to the Head, from whom the whole body, nourished and knit together through its joints and ligaments, grows with a growth that is from God." May we as St. Paul's Lutheran Church and School during this New Year continue to make connections and grow together in faith. God's blessings.


"GOSPEL OF MARK" BIBLE STUDY


