LSB657, st 4 - A Mighty Fortress Is Our God


In an email recently, I received a list of four reasons why children need to see and hear parents doing devotions. In *A Mighty Fortress*, Luther talks about the fact that God's Word abides. God's Word, the scriptures, but also God's Word made flesh, Jesus! It is important that we share both and we need to start that in the home.

In the email, the author wrote: For many years now, I've asked students about their quiet time with the Lord. Frankly, many struggle with consistency, especially with prayer. Anecdotally, though, here's what I've learned: the students who struggle least tend to have had parents who modeled quiet times for them. Sometimes they did that intentionally, but at other times it just happened. Their parents did their

quiet time in a more public place, and their kids took note. Here's why that matters:

1. Kids need to see a devotional life beyond Sunday.

If all they see happens on Sunday, they'll assume that Sunday is the only day to be with God. Likewise, if the only prayers they ever hear are over dinner, they'll learn that's the only time to pray.



One of the ways they'll learn that Christianity changes lives is by seeing their parents read the Word and hearing them speak to God throughout the week. Their first role models need to be in their home.

3. They need to hear prayers over them and about them.

Even if it seems they're not listening, they need memories of their parents' voices praying for them. They'll need to hear those voices in their heads years later when the world sends them alternative messages.

4. They need memories to encourage them in the years to come.

Maybe it's a well-worn Bible with Daddy's notes in it. Perhaps it's Momma's prayer notebook that's crinkled over the years. Or, maybe it's an electronic journal written by one of their parents. In any case, it will be a gift they'll cling to years later.

Think about that parents and grandparents! Involve your kids and grandkids in your devotional time. If you have no children, perhaps you can share your devotions with nieces and nephews and others that God brings your way. You may still need some completely alone time with God, but don't miss the opportunity to invite others to join you.

If your preschooler grants you only 15 seconds of attention, put them on your lap for 15 seconds - then tell them a one-sentence story with your Bible open, and say a prayer for them. If your teenager will give you only that same amount of time, pray a scripture verse over her before she starts the day. Send your adult children an email each day, letting them know what the Lord is showing you from His Word. Occasionally, send them a text telling them how you're praying for them.

If your devotional life is inactive or lacking, try picking up a devotional we have available for you at the church or school. There are PORTALS OF PRAYER and MY DEVOTIONS. Each booklet is a quarters worth of devotions and prayers. You don't have to be a Bible scholar to do devotions. But starting them is important.

It matters that our kids learn from us how to spend time with God.

In November, many Americans will gather with family and friends around a dinner table that will contain a feast that would have been the envy of many kings and princes in ages past. Even though we may face tough times, we are still blessed to live in the United States of America.

The Apostle Paul reminded the Thessalonians of the need to not only rejoice in the midst of challenges, but to be thankful. "Rejoice always, pray without



ceasing, and in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).

When I read that passage from St. Paul, I can't help but think of the Pilgrims. In October of 1621, William Bradford, Governor of Plymouth, declared the first official day of Thanksgiving. The public proclamation on behalf of the Pilgrims came as a result of their first bountiful harvest. The Pilgrims were overflowing with gratitude to God because the harvest of 1621 provided more than enough corn to see them through their second winter.

History records that Indian chief Massasoit arrived unexpectedly a day early for the celebration. The Chief brought 90 Indians with him--causing the Pilgrims to nearly despair, questioning whether or not they could feed that many without dangerously diminishing their winter supply of food. As it turned out, the Indians had arrived early so they could hunt and contribute to the feast. The Indians provided five dressed deer and more than a dozen fat wild turkeys. There was plenty of food - - which was even more of a reason to give thanks.

In fact, that's what they did; they extended the Thanksgiving celebration to three days.

But what were they giving thanks for? It depends who you ask. The politically correct response is that the pilgrims were giving thanks to the Indians. To get the true answer, we need to look back.

The Pilgrims' journey began in Holland - - not for religious freedom, as is often cited, but for the freedom to build a community on biblical principles for their children. They had left England, where they did not have religious freedom and moved to Holland where they were free to worship as they pleased. But the culture was so corrupt, they made plans to go to the New World.

What was that journey like? One hundred two Pilgrims had been crammed into a space on the Mayflower that was about the size of a volleyball court. Compound that misery with the lack of light and fresh air (all the hatches had to be battened down because of stormy

weather) and a limited diet of dried pork, dried peas, and dried fish, and the stench of an "ever fouler bilge" which lasted for 66 days at sea.

They arrived in the fall of 1620 just in time to prepare for winter. During that first winter, nearly half of the 102 pilgrims died - - 47 in all. In February, at the height of winter, they were dying at a rate of two per day. Thirteen out of 18 of the wives died, with only three families remaining unbroken by death that first winter. Yet even still, they were thankful. And they remained thankful even though at times their daily rations consisted of one kernel of corn.



The experiences of the Pilgrims were recorded in the historical work Of Plymouth Plantation, penned by their leader, Governor William Bradford, who said of the Pilgrims, "Last and not least, they cherished a great hope and inward zeal of laying good foundations, or at least making some ways toward it, for the propagation and advance of the gospel of the kingdom of Christ in the remote parts of the world, even though they should be but stepping stones to others in the performance of so great a work."

So, they were giving thanks to God for all things that had brought them to that moment in time. They were thankful for God's provision, protection through trials, and assistance from the Indian tribes. But they saw it as God working through all those things to supply their needs for the celebration.

The Pilgrims had the ability to rejoice and hope even in the midst of death and great need because they knew their lives served a greater, eternal purpose.

My friends, the same is true for you and me. When we know and follow Jesus Christ, our lives have that same eternal purpose and that alone gives us a reason to rejoice and be thankful.

I pray that you can join us for worship to give thanks God each and every weekend, but also join us as we celebrate the national holiday of Thanksgiving in November. Please join us in worship on Wednesday, 11/27 at 7pm or on Thursday, 11/28 at 10am. Both services will be held at the downtown church in Kankakee.

LOVE THAT LASTS

"Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him." I John 2:15

A one degree error in the short run does not seem like much of an error, but a one degree error over several miles does matter. You can wind up hundreds of miles apart over a long distance. The same is true for doctrine. A one degree error might seem at first as though nothing has changed. But when we allow a one degree deviation from the Truth that one degree can bring about devastating consequences for a congregation. This is the Apostle John's warning in 1 John 2:15. The warning is that if we love the world then the love of the Father is not in us.

As Christians we can be tempted to deviate from God's Truth to make the Christianity seem more palpable but in doing so we lose the power of the Gospel – the forgiveness of sins. In my newsletter article, I will go over three challenges to the Christian faith that if left unaddressed will cause severe spiritual consequences down the road. Just a note, this list is not exhaustive. I could add more as we are beset by a world that rejects Christ and His Truth. The three major temptations we face as a church in the 21st century include expressive individualism, a culture that indulges in hatred, anger, and fear, and a culture that celebrates libertinism.

• We live in culture that loves expressive individualism. The Gospel Coalition identifies expressive individualism as one of the greatest challenges to the church. Expressive individualism seeks self-fulfillment as the purpose and meaning in life. No longer are individuals bound by a common commitment together in the form of confession and community. Instead, individuals seek to get "something out of" institutions. Loyalty to an institution is based on how that person feels – and that feeling can change day to day. The Father's love is not based on a feeling but upon the work of His Son to give us eternal life. The love of the Father is countercultural in a self-serving world. God's love through the work of Jesus turns us of from being inward focused to outward focused. In the church, we don't seek to serve ourselves but seek to serve others. (Luke 22:24-27; John 3:16; 1 John 3:16-18)


- We live in a culture that loves to indulge in hatred, anger, and fear. When I was at the Lay Leadership Summit a few weeks ago, I was able to speak to a lot of people as I was the Set Apart to Serve representative for district. Many were fearful of the future of the church. The church is indeed in serious decline in North America. However, we are not to meet the challenges of ministry with hatred, anger, and fear. The love of the Father is not found in hatred, anger, and fear. While the world indulges in these emotions, it should not be so for Christians. These emotions are going to bubble up as Election Day approaches as fear, anxiety, and anger grip the spirit of the nation. John reminds us Christians that perfect love casts out fear. James further reminds us that anger does not produce the righteousness of God. While not compromising the Truth of Christianity on several hot topic issues, we are to respond to the world's attacks with kindness and love. (James 1:20; 1 John 4:18)
- We live in a culture that embraces libertinism over the Truth. Libertinism is a worldview that boils down to "live and let live" or "you do you" as long as it doesn't directly harm anyone. Certain sins are now celebrated in our culture. The problem we face is that the world is highly effective in catechizing ourselves and our children in its ways that speak against the Christian Truth. We may want to respond to this challenge by hunkering down in our fortress church, however, we cannot avoid the world. I wish we could ignore the world and only talk about positive things. As our Lord speaks in John 17, we live in the world but we are not of it. (John 17:16-19) No matter how much we try to shelter ourselves or our children from the world, we will be exposed to the world and its ways. Even Jesus in the wilderness could not avoid the temptations of the world (Matthew 4:1-11). A friend of mine who homeschools his children told me that transgender ideology was spread to his children through interactions with cousins. The only effective way to combat the world's catechizing is to daily catechize yourselves and your children using the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God. (Ephesians 6:17)

The Christian Truth compels us to reject the world and its lies. The world's conceit is that it matters more than God. Be reminded of this: This world will not last forever. The challenges we face will not last forever, however, the love of the Father for you does last forever. In response to the Father's love, focus on the things that actually matter. Look to where you can serve your neighbor or where you can serve here at St. Paul's. The love of the Father abides in those who serve others. Reject those who amplify voices of hatred,

anger, and fear. The love of the Father is not in those who indulge in and promote hatred, anger, and fear.

The world will seek to catechize us in its ways over God's ways. Reject the world's ways and lies. Be in God's Word. Be in God's Word in daily devotions. Be in God's Word by coming to church. The Father sent His Son to die for you. This wondrous news is beyond all imagination. Show the love that the Father has given to you through His Son to others. Keep first things first in your life. The first thing and only thing needful for us is the great confession: "Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) Go into the world with that one needful thing needful in life – the Father's love in Jesus. We have a message the world can't beat. Amen.

"GOD'S FOREVER PROMISE TO DAVID CONTINUES"

Pastor Drinnon has started a new Bible study on 1st & 2nd Kings. These Old Testament books grant us insight into the rise of Solomon's kingdom, the schism between the Northern & Southern Kingdoms, and the eventual destruction of Israel and Judah for their unfaithfulness. Nevertheless, God remains faithful to David and His promises to Him throughout the entire history of the kingdoms of Israel and Judah. God remains faithful even today.

This study will be exploring these topics: 1) Faithfulness & Obedience: The central theme throughout both books is the importance of faithfulness to God's promises and obedience to His commands. Kings who followed God's ways experienced blessings and protection, while those who turned away faced dire consequences.

- 2) Leadership & Responsibility: The kings of Israel and Judah served as both political and spiritual leaders. Their decisions affected the spiritual well-being of the entire nation. This underscores the profound responsibility of leadership in all spheres of life.
- 3) The Preaching of the Word of God: The role of prophets such as Elijah, Elisha,

and others is prominently featured in these books. They spoke God's word with authority, calling kings and people alike to repentance and faithfulness. Their lives and ministries demonstrate the power of prophetic obedience and God's faithfulness to His promises.

Although 1st & 2nd Kings are historical books, they continue to be relevant to us today reminding us for the need to be personally faithful to God, the need for faithful leadership, and to listen to the Word of God in aspects of our life. This study will enrich both newcomers and Bible study veterans alike as we delve deep into God's Word.

Fleece Blanket Instructions

- 1. Select fleece material for a two-sided blanket. When selecting the material, choose one that is patterned and one that is a solid coordinating color. Please purchase 1 1/4 yards of each fabric. (after it measures 40×60)
- 2. Spread out the material on a flat surface with the softer or more brightly colored sides facing out. Keep the fleece pieces together and trim the edges, if needed, to meet the size requirements. (be sure to remove selvage edges)
- 3. Cut out a 4"x4" square of fabric out of each corner. Make sure that you are cutting both pieces of fleece at the same time. After the square corners are cut, start cutting strips along the sides of the blanket. Starting at the corner, cut strips approximately 2/3 to 1" wide and 4" long. The strips don't have to be exactly uniform, but they should be approximately the same size.
- 4. Once your blanket fringes have been cut, tie the strips together using a simple knot, attaching the bottom layer to the top layer. Keep first knot slightly loose & tie the second knot securley. tight. You'll want to tie two knots in each strip.
- 5. When finished tying, trim the fringes, so that they are neat and even.
