


CHERISH YOUR FREEDOM

It is for freedom that Christ has set you free (Galatians 5:1)

How will you celebrate Independence Day this year? Maybe you can wave a flag, watch fireworks or attend a family reunion. Typically, we all enjoy some free time on the Fourth of July holiday.

But have you thought about some of the more important freedoms you enjoy as a citizen of the United States of America? Freedoms like the right to gather for a church service, elect



And yet, not one of these freedoms has come to us without a cost. Men and women have given their lives to win and protect the freedoms we enjoy as a nation. Did you know that of the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence, 5 of them were captured and tortured by the British army, 12 of them lost their homes and 9 of them died of wounds sustained in battle? It only further proves the timeless truth: **Freedom is never completely free.**

Well, if that's true of political freedom, it is even more true of spiritual freedom.

As Christians, we have been given by Christ freedom from sin - freedom from the guilt of our sins, freedom from the power of our sins and freedom from the eternal punishment of our sins. And yet, these freedoms did not come without a cost. **Our freedom cost Jesus his life.**

The question is, what will we do with our freedom?

- Will we use our freedom as a license to disobey God's will for our lives?
- **X** Will we use our freedom to serve our own desires?

St. Paul offers this wise counsel:

Using our freedom appropriately means serving God and others, rather than serving "self." Christ's loving sacrifice gives us both the model and the motivation to properly use the freedom we've been given.

The 4th of July is a day to celebrate the freedom that God has given us here in the United States. But it's just one of 365 days a year for us to live the real freedom that God has given us as redeemed, forgiven, Spirit-filled children of God.

Time With God This Summer

"Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matthew 11:28

Summer is a busy time. We have family gatherings throughout the summer, Family reunions, as well as other opportunities to get together. These are wonderful times and we also know what it's like when members of the family can't make it to these gatherings. You know what it's like when a beloved family member doesn't



show up for the family gathering and meal at Christmas, Thanksgiving, or Easter: There's a hole, a gap, a pain that everyone feels. We miss that person in our midst. Their absence diminishes the joy of the whole family.

The same is true of God's children. Every Sunday is a gathering of the family: The family of God. We gather to hear the Word of our Heavenly Father and to join together in eating our family meal - the Sacrament of Holy Communion when it is offered.

When you choose to pass on weekend worship, when you don't come together with your church family to join in offering the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving and to receive the gifts your Lord has for you; it's not just you who misses out. Your extended family, the church, misses out. All of us are diminished by your decision to take a summer break from church. The singing is that much quieter. The "amens" are that much softer. The spot where you usually sit and stand reminds us all of your absence.

I read a comment recently from a church leader who said, "Christian discipleship should begin with a very simple commitment that any given Lord's day will find you in the assembly of God's people, singing His praise, offering your prayers, receiving His gifts."

It's simply what it means to be a Christian. It's who we are and what we do as God's people. As a pastor, it grieves me, as well as the rest of God's family, to see people missing from worship.

We have entered that time of the year when the things that compete for our time and attention are even greater. When people decide that camping, four wheeling, baseball, or whatever else are more important than gathering together with their brothers and sisters in Christ.

We miss seeing many of you throughout the summer. I know many are traveling on vacations and family reunions which keeps you from joining us in worship. But all too often, I see posts online about someone keeping busy on a Saturday or Sunday only to realize that I did not see you in church.

We miss you. Don't forget to join us for worship if you are in town.

Here are few things you can do to make your vacation spiritually uplifting (and pleasing to God):

Visiting a church while away can create fond memories and connect you with the larger body of believers.





our account. Our electronic giving program offers convenience

Athanasius and the Nicene Creed: A Legacy for Confessional Lutherans 1700 Years Later

In 325 A.D., the Church gathered at the Council of Nicaea to address a growing division caused by the teachings of Arius, a priest from Alexandria. Arius claimed that Christ was not fully divine but a created being—an idea that struck at the heart of Christian faith. Presiding over the council, Emperor Constantine recognized the seriousness of the moment, famously stating, "Division in the Church is more dangerous than war or battle."





a bishop himself—who boldly defended the full divinity of Christ. For 1700 years, the Nicene Creed has united the Church in the confession of the Trinity and the saving truth of Jesus Christ as true God and true man. In our own age of confusion and compromise, Athanasius remains a model of faithful conviction under pressure to conform to the world.

To understand the significance of Nicaea, we must also recall the trials that preceded it. In the 3rd century, the Roman Empire was torn apart during the Crisis of the Third Century, when political instability led to two widespread persecutions of Christians—under Decius (c. 250) and Diocletian (303). Christians were scapegoated for the Empire's troubles, mocked as atheists, and targeted for rejecting Rome's traditional gods. No one could have foreseen that only a decade after Diocletian's persecution, Christianity would receive legal protection under the Edict of Milan (313) through Emperor Constantine.

With persecution ended, new internal challenges arose. The Church, once persecuted from without, now faced heresy from within. Arius taught that the Son of God was a created being—"There was when He was not." His Christ was not coequal with the Father, but more like an apprentice to the Creator. The controversy demanded a response, and Constantine—at first dismissive—came to see that the very truth of Christianity was on the line.

The Nicene Creed, forged in this fire, remains our enduring confession. It echoes in our sanctuaries today—unchanged, unwavering, and still proclaiming Christ as "God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God." Athanasius would work tirelessly to ensure that the confession of the true faith would endure.

The Council of Nicaea did not end Arianism. Arius' teachings resurged and spread so widely that Jerome once said, "The whole world groaned and was astonished to find itself Arian." Amid this storm, Athanasius stood firm for Christ's full divinity, earning the title contra mundum—"against the world." He was exiled five times and spent only a decade in peace, during which he wrote works like On the Incarnation and The Life of Anthony.

Athanasius fought for a crucial truth: **only God can save.** As he taught, "**What is not assumed is not redeemed.**" If Christ were not fully God, He could not restore the divine image or rescue creation from sin, death, and chaos. Later, Martin Luther would echo this truth in his teaching of the Great Exchange: Christ takes our sin and death, and gives us His righteousness and life (1 Peter 3:18).

Athanasius remained faithful under intense pressure and persecution, a model of steadfast confession in a hostile world. As heirs of this legacy, we stand with him every time we confess the Nicene Creed—one of the three Ecumenical Creeds in the Book of Concord. The Creed unites us with the Church across time, for "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).


Athanasius reminds us that faithfulness to Christ's person and work is faithfulness to the Gospel. His clear confession protects the doctrine of justification by grace through faith. In *On the Incarnation*, he writes, "The Word of God came in His own person, because it was He alone, the image of the Father, who could recreate man made after the image." Salvation is God's work alone.

This 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed is a time for gratitude and reflection. God has preserved His Gospel through the faithful witness of the Church. For deeper study, see the latest *Lutheran Witness* or attend the Nicene Creed symposium hosted by Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. We recently celebrated this milestone (May 17–18), which also coincides with the celebration of the 165th anniversary of St. Paul's Lutheran Church and the 160th of our school.

The Nicene faith is not just history—it lives in the Church today. We proclaim it every Communion Sunday, joining the confession handed down through generations. Athanasius'

example reminds us that the Truth is worth contending for. The Truth is worth suffering for because Christ is worth suffering for. As Christians we have nothing to fear because, "By his death, He has destroyed death, and by his Resurrection, He has restored life." (On the Incarnation Section 10.5; paraphrased for clarity) The church for centuries has persevered with thanksgiving under persecution and hardship. We ought me the challenges of the day with the same zeal and joy as our forefathers and foremothers in the faith had.

"We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ..."—words we share with St. Paul (1 Corinthians 8:6) and with Athanasius. As Confessional Lutherans, we remain heirs of his confession and stewards of the same saving truth.




