
#### TRUNK OR TREAT

#### HERE I STAND!!

"Here I stand, I can do no other, God help me. Amen."

At the end of September, Lynda and I were blessed to go on a trip to Germany again with the Balgeman tour group. We also went PASTO in 2010 and visited many of the Luther sites as well as attended the Passion Play in Oberammergau.



#### First things

A couple of definitions are needed as we continue:

**DIET** - A Diet was a meeting of the Princes and the Emperor and the city of Worms was the next location for their meeting in 1521, so the "Diet of Worms" is not what it sounds like @.

**DISPUTATION** - This was a formal academic debate about various topics. The Heidleberg Disputation came after Luther posted his theses for debate on the church door in Wittenberg in 1517.

TOTAL DEPRAVITY - By this, we affirm that man's nature is thoroughly corrupted by the fall and his natural inclination is to sin against God.

BONDAGE OF THE WILL - The will, in a spiritual sense, is enslaved to sin and cannot freely choose God or respond to the Gospel.

Let's look at these places that Luther visited:

#### Heidelberg

On August 26, 1518, in the lecture hall of the Augustinian order, was the Heidelberg Disputation. It was here that Martin Luther, as a delegate for his order, began to have occasion to articulate his views. In the defense of his theses, Luther defended the doctrine of human depravity and the bondage of the will. Martin Bucer, the reformer of Strasbourg, heard Luther here and became an avid follower. This disputation also led to Johann Eck's challenging Martin Luther to the Leipzig Debate.

#### Augsburg

A couple of months later, Martin Luther had a hearing before Cardinal Cajetan at the Imperial Diet of Augsburg on October 12, 1518. The subject of the hearing before Cajetan was Luther's famous 95 theses which had been posted on the doors of the Castle Church in Wittenberg almost a year earlier. When Luther appeared before Cajetan on October 12, Cajetan asked him to recant his errors. To which Luther asked to be shown

where he was in error according to the Scriptures. After the Reformation began to take hold, the German princes would meet the Emperor in Augsburg to declare their faith.

#### Worms

The Diet of Worms of 1521 was pivotal for Martin Luther.

This imperial diet of the Holy Roman Empire was called by Emperor Charles V and conducted in the Imperial Free City of Worms. Martin Luther was summoned to the diet in order to renounce or reaffirm his views in response to a Papal bull of Pope Leo X.

In answer to questioning, Luther defended the views that had been criticized and refused to recant them. At the end of the diet, the Emperor issued the Edict of Worms, a decree which condemned Luther as "a notorious heretic" and banned citizens of the Empire from propagating his ideas. Although the Reformation is usually considered to have begun in 1517, this edict is the first overt schism associated with it.

#### Reflections

One of the interesting things about this trip was walking with Luther at some of the same places that he walked

as his theology was becoming more clear and more centered in God's Word

This is a photo of Lynda and me in front of the monument to the reformers at Worms with Luther at the center. The photo on the next page is of the spot, supposedly, where Martin Luther stood when he uttered those famous words. "Here I stand, I can do no other, God help me. Amen."



(NOW, . . . There is some debate as to whether Luther actually said those words. If you are interested, this article might be helpful. [https://blog.cph.org/read/everyday-faith/lutheranism/did-luther-really-say-here-i-stand]. I'd like to think that Luther did say those words.)

At each place, in his debate and speeches, Luther desired that the Church realize that it had diverted from God's Word and that they should reject some of the practices that had crept in over the years.

At each place, Luther declared that what he had written and preached, stood firm on God's Word.

At each place, Luther asked that they refute his assertions using God's Word ALONE.

#### HERE I STAND TODAY

Isn't that our challenge today? We look to God's Word over and against the messages of

the devil, the world, and our own sinful nature. We cling to God's Word of promise and hope that in Jesus, our sins are forgiven, we are claimed as His own children, and our eternity is certain and secure in His hands.

Now, more than ever, we need to be anchored on God's Word. Society, social media, mainstream media, peer pressure, and sometimes popular opinion, push us to reject what God's Word says and to follow the crowd. If you refuse, you face protests, anger, sometimes pressure, and even (more recently) violence may be directed your way.

Are you willing to be anchored on God's Word Alone? No matter what your friends or family might say? No matter what your boss or co-workers might say? Scripture tells us to speak the truth in love. To speak God's Word of truth in love, means that you need to know God's Word. Are you willing to study and meditate on God's Word?

Let us be that bright light of God's Word and truth in a world that wants to reject Him! Speaking the truth is a loving thing to do. That you care enough to risk your relationships to speak God's truth to the people you love the most.



God's Word can be an anchor in these chaotic and violent times. His truths are an anchor for you and me in good times, in turbulent times, and in times when it seems like the evil one is winning.

GOD'S WORD ALONE lifts our eyes from this vale of tears and helps us focus on our true inheritance, our true homeland, being with Jesus face-to-face for all eternity.

May God's Word preached, read, studied, prayed, and lived here at St. Paul's bring to you the joy of being a child of God, the confidence of knowing God is with you always to the end of the age, and the comfort of God's presence as your Good Shepherd throughout your life.

#### Give As You Are Blessed - (Guided By The Tithe)

God has demonstrated His love for us by creating and redeeming us. A meaningful way we express our gratitude to God is though our faithful giving. By God's grace, we can make giving important, and, when we do, we give Him the glory and honor that He deserves. Faith enables us to give freely and generously. Our giving can have no greater foundation than the Gospel of forgiveness and God's promises.

In His Word, God gives us giving principles.

We are called to give cheerfully, regularly, sacrificially, and proportionately of our firstfruits.

Even with all these giving principles, one question that all of us have likely asked is, "How much should I give?" In the Old Testament, God answered that question. God's people were commanded to tithe, which meant they were to give one-tenth of their crops, livestock, and gold and silver. But the tithe does not answer the question, "Why give?" However, it does help to answer the question, "How much should I give?"

The Apostle Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper..." According to the income that we receive, we are to give proportionately. The tithe acts as a Biblical guide to calculate the dollar amount to give. Because Abraham, Jacob, and Moses tithed even before the law was given, could the tithe be a benchmark for us to consider as well?

In the New Testament, Jesus affirms the tithe when He told the Pharisees to continue tithing but not to neglect "the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness" (Matthew 23:23).

It is interesting that, other than the tithe, the only giving referenced in the New Testament exceeded the tithe. Jesus asked His disciples to follow Him and leave everything they owned behind. He directed the Rich Young Ruler to give all His money away. Jesus commended the widow when she gave her last two mites. When He changed Zacchaeus' heart, Zacchaeus gave half of his wealth to the poor. Jesus said, "Freely you have received, freely give" (Matthew 10:8 NIV), and, in Acts 20:35, He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

When we examine what we give, remember that God wants our hearts more than our gifts.

May God grant us hearts of faith that give freely and generously. May God bless you on your stewardship journey during the **TEN for TEN Giving Challenge** and beyond.

Even with our giving, we can "Persevere with Thanksgiving"!!

#### Catechism Spotlight

#### 1st Commandment: Keeping First Things First

What do you find yourself trusting most when life gets uncertain—a person, a plan, money, or something else?

Take a moment to consider your answer. How does what you trust shape your decisions, your priorities, and your peace of mind? This is exactly what the First Commandment calls us to examine: Who or what do we truly rely on in every area of life?

When we hear the words, "You shall have no other gods before me" (Exodus 20:3), it's easy to picture ancient people bowing before golden statues or stone idols. We might wonder, does this really apply to us today? After all, most of us don't have shrines in our living rooms. Yet the First Commandment is far from outdated—it goes straight to the heart of what, or whom, we trust most in life.

Luther puts it simply and powerfully in the *Large Catechism*:

A god is that to which we look for all good and in which we find refuge in every time of need. To have a god is nothing else than to trust and believe him with our whole heart  $(LC\ 1-2)$ .

In many ways, the rest of the Ten Commandments are really an explanation of the First. Each one shows what it means to fear, love, and trust God above all things. I often remind my confirmands that breaking any commandment also breaks the First, because sin always begins with turning away from God. Whenever we sin, we are essentially saying, "I know better than You." We put ourselves in the place of judge over matters that God has already decided. This was the very failure of our first parents. When Satan tempted Eve with the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, he promised, "You will be like God" (Gen. 3:4). And every time we sin, we echo that same rebellion begun in Eden.

This stands in sharp contrast to our Lord's sinless life. In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus honored the First Commandment perfectly when He prayed, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done" (Luke 22:41–42). Unlike us, He trusted His Father fully. Jesus kept the Law in every

way—both in His active obedience, living the perfect life we could not, and in His passive obedience, suffering the punishment our sins deserved. On the cross He bore the penalty for our rebellion. Through His death and resurrection, He now gives us forgiveness, eternal life, and salvation. Satan's lies give way to God's truths: God became man so that we might share in His life.


When the First Commandment takes its rightful place in our hearts, everything else falls into order. But when anything takes God's place—whether money, sports, reputation, or security—that is exactly where the devil works and where everything begins to unravel. Our sinful nature longs to wrest control from God, insisting on our way over His. Yet by His grace, Christ restores us, drawing us back to trust the only true God.

With humble hearts, let us follow our Lord and keep Him first. We do this by gathering in the Divine Service, where He gives us His very body and blood for the forgiveness of our sins. In Him we have every blessing—both for this life and for the life of the world to come. As St. Paul writes, "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Colossians 3:17). May our lives be marked by thankfulness to the Lord who has given us all things. So let us keep first things first. Amen.

#### A NEW ERA OF HOPE AND MISSION IN DOWNTOWN KANKAKEE



On Saturday, September 20<sup>th</sup>, we celebrated the grand opening of the Phil's Friends Kankakee Hope Center. The weather was decent; only a few raindrops fell as the church and community gathered to witness the rebirth of the St. Paul's old school building with a new mission—bringing hope to those affected by cancer.

The lovely temperatures set the tone for the event, as speakers shared

heartfelt words about the significance of this moment. The space, originally dedicated to the service of the Lord in 1959 as a school, has seen many chapters in its life. After the school moved away in 1991, the building continued its service as Sunday school classrooms until 2009. For many years after, it fell silent, except for a few ministries who remained faithful to using the building in service.

But now, this once-vibrant space, full of life with children learning and growing in faith, is being revived with a new purpose. The Kankakee Hope Center is now dedicated to supporting those affected by cancer. Every Thursday evening from 6 pm to 8 pm and on two Saturdays each month, volunteers gather to assemble care packages that offer comfort, hope, and love to those facing a cancer journey.

This new mission is breathing fresh life into the building and, we hope, into the heart of downtown Kankakee. The grand opening of the Phil's Friends Hope Center marks not just the start of a new chapter for this historic building, but also a new era of outreach

and service for St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Our mission is to bring together volunteers from all over the community to spread hope and care to those battling cancer.

We are excited to invite everyone to join us in this new venture. We hope you'll consider being part of this meaningful work. # PHIL'S FRIENDS KANKAKEE HOPE CENTER NOW OPEN!


